In August 2007, our Lord and Savior laid it upon my heart to go to Mozambique, Africa on a prayer team with five other people I did not know (except for my mother, Paula Leasure). For what purpose? At the time, I did not know. What, if anything, could God use me for? I struggled day in and day out trying to search the characteristics in my life that He might be able to use on a prayer team to Africa of all places, and I could not find one. I feel that my prayer life is weak, meaning that I am not one of those that pray and mountains move or the hairs on the back of your neck stand up as you listen. Due to this, I fought His calling, and I challenged it as well every step of the way. My old passport had expired, and everyone I

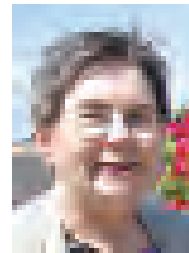
spoke with said it would take at least three months to get a new one issued. I challenged God, "If this is Your will You will make it clear, where You lead, I will follow." Exactly one week and four days from the time I filed for the new passport I had a new one in my hands. That's not our government working,

The MOZAMBIQUE PRAYER STRATEGY:

Karlene Clendenning is the Country Prayer Champion for Mozambique, having assumed that position from Dave & Ann Dedrick who are now full-time OMS missionaries in Mozambique. In

October, 2007 Karlene was part of a fly-around of Mozambique, touching down in 8 of the 10 provinces, standing on the ground and claiming it for Christ. A team member, Troy Leasure, felt the Lord's call to be Sector Leader for sector #7 (see map), and Karlene is recruiting for Sector Leaders for the other nine provinces.

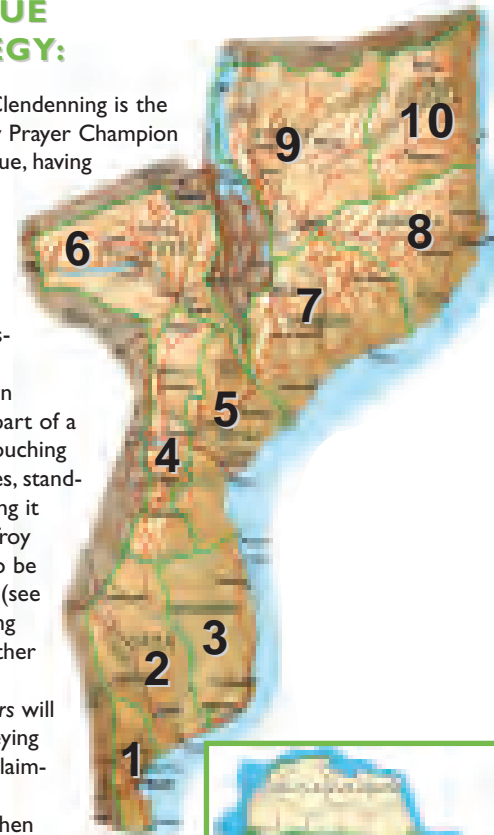
The 10 Sector Prayer Leaders will visit Mozambique, each surveying their respective Sector and claiming it for Christ (see map).

The Sector Prayer Leaders then recruit intercessors and organize them into cells, to pray for specific needs in the 10 Sectors.

Prayer information is gathered by visiting MFMI Intercessory Teams, by missionaries in Mozambique, and by searching internet sites and various publications. Information is communicated through the *Field Champion* and *Sector Prayer Leaders* to the prayer cells.

that's our God's hand at work.

Even though I knew He called and it was His will, I knew my warrior strengths and weaknesses. I am not articulate in speech, I did not know the language, and I had not even met the people that made up the prayer team, so how was I going to be a source of inspiration or encouragement to them? As I pondered upon this He delivered this verse, "The Lord will guide you always; He will satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched land" Isaiah 58:11 Wow! Can He get any more clear?

Mozambique – what an amazing country. But what's more amazing is our God, how He shows us the

imperfections of our own lives and our own walk with Him when we let go of who we think we are, what we think we are capable of or not and say, "Where You lead, I will follow, when You speak I will listen, and when You call I will answer." What joy and peace overwhelms the one who lets Him guide their every step. The first thing that He revealed to me while I was in Mozambique was my own lack of giving Him the thanks and praise He deserves for what I have. "Forgive me, for everything I own is a blessing from You. Forgive me, for my selfishness in thinking that my desires and needs are more important than Thy praise." Second, He broke my vessel. What I thought was usable, He showed me the cracks that were letting His blessings slip through by my own silence. In Mozambique people live in stick houses, some have roofs, some don't, some are able to eat every day, and some can't afford to eat. Nonetheless, they shout His praises so that their neighbors hear. The Spirit moves upon a person who is willing to lift his voice in praise, to let go of what he thinks his neighbors might say. The spiritual blessings we receive when we let Him re-break us so that He can re-fill us. "Forgive me, for allowing cracks to empty the blessings You had in store for me." Thirdly, He tenderized my Spirit of sensitivity, empathy, and love towards others.

Teach me to be the vessel that can be used for

Your glory let me not forget the people that have so little, but have so much in You, and thank You for breaking me so that I may love others as You have loved me." He is a wonderful God that we serve and He has so much He wants to show us, teach us, and gives us if we only say...

He Holds The Key

Taking the Gospel into South Asia

MFMI Prayer Initiative – South Asia

And Jesus came and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Amen. – Matthew 28:18-20

The key to the missionary's work is the authority of Jesus Christ, not the needs of the lost. We are inclined to look on our Lord as one who assists us in our endeavors for God. Yet our Lord places Himself as the absolute sovereign and supreme Lord over His disciples. He does not say that the lost will never be saved if we don't go—He simply says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations..." He says, "Go on the basis of the revealed truth of My sovereignty, teaching and preaching out of your living experience of Me." (Reading from *My Utmost for His Highest*, October 14th)

When I travel to South Asia, my heart cries with compassion for the people. I look at their life circumstances and see that more than 80 percent of the people exist on \$2 U.S. per day or less. Water, food, shelter, education, and health care are below subsistence. It is a land plagued by yearly flooding and the associated devastation. It is a land where Christians are less than one percent of the population. There are souls in the balance.

The Key to the Work is not in our hands as we attempt to meet the humanitarian needs. It is in the hands of our sovereign Christ, who is anointing men and women in that land to share the Gospel. In 1989, God's Hand fell upon Brother Philip, one who was born and raised there. It was after one of the "great floods" that Brother Philip began to preach in a small rural village. Over a ten day period between 3,000 and 5,000 people traveled to his home village to seek God in the midst of great distress. Many were won to Christ and many were miraculously healed. From those days of revival, a church was born.

In the years that followed, the church not only grew, but it continued to mature. Its ministry spread across the land. The power of the Gospel to change was always foremost. In 1997 Brother Philip was joined by ECC (Every Community for Christ). Resources, training, and prayer encouragement reached across the world. Teams went out. Numerical growth became a growth of multiplication! From thirty churches in 1997 to nearly nine hundred today!

As you examine God's work through Brother Philip, you will be amazed at how the different facets function together as tools in God's Hand. There is a ministry to approximately 1,500 orphaned children. There are 100+ schools that minister to educate nearly 7,000 children. When the floods came this year, more than 2,000 families were helped with food and water. Economic improvement comes as 4,000 people are participating in the "Micro Economic Development" program. Short-term medical teams from the states

have ministered to the needs in different areas. Facilities have been built in different areas to be used for housing, schools, training, and humanitarian needs. It excites me to be in partnership with such a ministry! But that is only on the surface.

Last spring we attended the baptism of forty new believers in a small village in the north of one country. We were touched as new believers dedicated themselves to the Lord. Previously, I remembered God revealing to me in a dream the picture of an endless line of those desiring to come into Christ's Kingdom. What I dreamed became reality! In September and October of 2007, they registered approximately 1,500 baptisms! In fact, over the life of their church, approximately 50,000 believers have declared their dedication to Christ through baptism, and it is still growing!

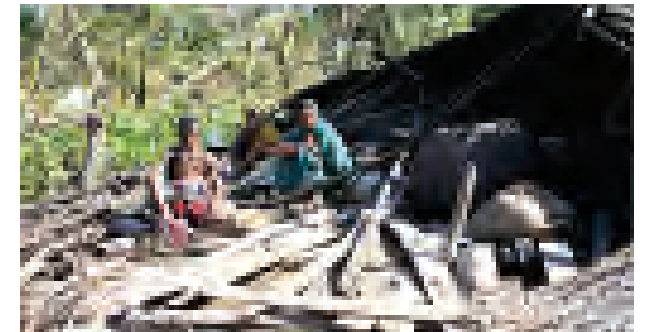
When I look and only see the humanitarian needs, my heart gets overwhelmed by despair. It has happened more than once. But when I look, I must remember that I am like a small boy with only my sack lunch to share. It is what I commit into the Lord's hands that can be broken and multiplied for "Kingdom" use. These are the true miracles!

Through our prayers and the sovereignty of God, the line of those to be baptized into the Church and be born into His Kingdom will continue. I believe that multiplication growth will become exponential in the next ten years. Would you join me in prayer for the work there? Even for the few that God may call there is an opportunity to join a medical team, a construction team, or a prayer team, just bring your lunch!

A number of years ago gospel recording artist Steve Green sang the song "He Holds the Keys." The power and authority to bring the kind of changes to that area

of South Asia can only be attributed to the "One who holds the keys." I stand amazed and am honored to participate in God's work through Brother Philip. To God be the Glory!

Going to Brazil gave us some tools for better serving missions back home. Sharing our experiences, pictures, and personal stories about our missionary family in Londrina opened hearts and eyes in our local congregation to conclude that Homer Christian Church doesn't just send missionary support to a country, or to a ministry, or even to a missionary who was born and raised in our home church. Our offerings really support a part of Christ's body...an arm of His Church that happens to touch an area of the world quite different from our own. But that faraway place doesn't seem quite so far away anymore.

It's common to have predetermined expectations about the first trip to a foreign country, and at the same time have no idea what to expect. From the minute we landed on Brazilian soil and walked into the Sao Paulo airport, we relied on the blue folder gripped tightly in my hand. We had spent our last three weeks at home and the last half hour of our long Delta flight reading and re-reading Micah's printed emails, reviewing his detailed instructions for getting through customs, exchanging money, finding the airport shuttle, and purchasing bus tickets.

With our few Portuguese words and lots of gestures, we managed to get ourselves

onto a shuttle, across the vast city, and seated on a Garcia bus headed for Londrina. Friendly passengers greeted us with words we couldn't understand. We nodded and smiled, "Bon dia," hoping our accents would explain our ignorance. Had we been tourists just winging it in South America, it would probably have been time for a panic attack, but

knowing Micah, Marla, and Samara would connect with us at the end of our eight hour bus ride had the same effect as a double dose of Prozac.

We were instantly immersed in customs that looked quite different from life in Anchor Point, Alaska. We speak English;

they speak Portuguese. We drive miles; they drive kilometers. We pump gas in gallons; they pump liters. Hot water flows from our indoor faucets; theirs is cold. We shop at a grocery store; they shop at street markets. We play basketball; they play soccer. Our rock hard avocados sell for \$2.00; theirs fall perfectly ripened from trees. We grow rhubarb and potatoes; they grow sugar cane and bananas. We flush our toilet paper; theirs goes in the trash. Our spiders are tiny, theirs are huge. We mop our linoleum floor; they hose down their tile. We have moose in the woods; they have monkeys in the trees. We pay our bills by mail; they stand in long lines. We take our garbage to the

dump; a horse drawn wagon picks up their trash bags. We drive to work; they walk or bike. We spend dollars; they spend reals. We roast hot dogs at picnics; they grill salted beef at chuascos.

Experiencing a different culture had many pieces, sights, sounds, smells, tastes, and language. But one word sums it up – people. Because of the network Micah and Marla have so capably woven with their Brazilian neighbors and church family, we were instantly loved and accepted. We were astounded that the language barrier could be so big, yet so small. What words could not communicate, spirits somehow revealed. We couldn't speak the same language, but through Micah and Marla as translators, we connected with the people. We shared Alaska pictures, taught Sunday school, joined hands in worship, sang together, prayed together, cried and laughed together. Our final Sunday evening was celebrated with a scrumptious duck dinner served to fifty plus beloved Brazilian brothers and sisters who swarmed Micah and Marla's little home to bid us farewell. Even with our limited understanding of Portuguese, smiles and hugs needed no translation.

Our trip to Brazil was a dream come true and was amazingly more than we could have ever expected. Saying goodbye to Micah, Marla, and precious baby Samara was agonizing and the pain doesn't go away. But to see the love and concern, feel the support and encouragement that Micah,

Marla, and Samara receive from their Brazilian family brings us joy and promises us they are in good hands. How thankful we are that God speaks Portuguese as well as English and that His love knows no borders and needs no passport.

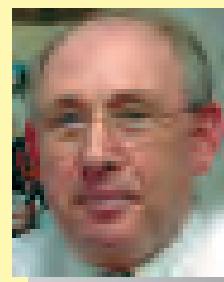

Our priority is establishing the Lordship of Jesus Christ in each man's life, and our goal is to provide opportunities for personal obedience to the Great Commission. Russia's "Rainbow of Hope"

From July 15-28, 2007, five people from central Iowa traveled half way around the world to experience many new things and hopefully, to be changed forever.

I think several of us were surprised how well the team worked together and got along. There were six Americans- five from my home church in Iowa, an Australian, four New Zealanders, and a North Irish girl, or should I say lass? After the newness of teasing each other for saying "lift" rather than "elevator" and "wee" rather than "little" we found different things to talk about—especially all that we were seeing and experiencing in this new world we found ourselves in.

This international team became the first MFMI/OMS team in Russia to work in an orphanage with a new ministry started by missionary Michelle Taylor called "Rainbow of Hope." We stayed with families from the church in Rybinsk, Russia and traveled daily one hour by crowded bus to a small village called Arefino. In this small, forgotten village we met little children who had also been forgotten, but whom we will probably never forget. Not all of the children here are true orphans. Many have irresponsible or abusive parents. They have been labeled with learning disabilities or behavioral disorders, but in the time we spent with them, only a couple displayed true learning or behavioral impairment. The rest were normal, active, fun-loving kids who wanted to be loved.

Our goal was to show God's love, as well as our own, to the children. There was a planned work project for the men—to repair the children's restrooms, and a VBS program for the ladies—a chance to share the gospel through fun Bible stories, games, and crafts. Along with work and VBS, there was lots of free time to toss balls, give hugs, and share special treats.

The work started off with a bang. Demolition is always easier and more fun than repair. The tiles flew off the walls for the older boys to haul out bucket load after bucket load and indescribably disgusting toilets were promptly removed from the building. The tedious task of making even walls took the next 5 days of work. Onto the walls, 2x1s were attached in rows, leveled, drilled, and leveled again – what seemed a hundred times. Only on the last day did the paneling and ceiling tiles begin to go up. The hard work perfecting the foundation made the part that would actually show go faster and look better. All work was headed up by an independent construction worker, named Victor, from the Rybinsk church. A couple days other men from the church came to help. The Russians will finish the walls, ceiling, floors, toilets, and sinks. But more importantly – many of the men plan to return on a regular basis to work with the young men and teach them skills they can use when they leave the orphanage to live on their own. The involvement of the church, especially the men, is a great answer to prayer in the life of this ministry.

In the VBS program, we were able to talk about God's beautiful creation, including each child, Abraham, and God's promise of blessing, Jesus' birth, His teachings and miracles, and finally His death and resurrection. We played ball games, bingo and memory games. We made play-doh creations, buttons, and puff-paint t-shirts. The kids loved the craft time more than anything, usually because it included freebies—but who can blame them?!

The children of Arefino orphanage have one set of clothing, get weekly baths, and devoured every bit of extra fruit we gave them. Christmas with a Mission

It's Jesus' Birthday! The Children's Ministry might have a "Happy Birthday Jesus" party but it usually ends by the time they grow into junior highers.

Around Cornerstone Church we're trying to make Jesus' Birthday the focus of Christmas for the entire church, every age group from youngest to oldest.

Christmas has become about commercialism. It's the season that is looked to as the savior of the American economy. The average American goes further into debt purchasing Christmas presents each year. A few years ago we decided to take a radically different approach and make Jesus the focus of Christmas, not just at church, but in every family, in every home.

Starting in 2006, I issued a challenge to spend less on ourselves at Christmas. Give 1/2 of what we would normally spend and give Jesus a present by alleviating the suffering of some of those who live in extreme poverty in our world. The heart of Jesus is with the poor, and if we want to know Jesus better, we must get close to the poor.

One of the two missions Cornerstone partners with is OMS-Haiti.

The Christmas Offering has changed our church. Children bring their piggy banks to add in, families really do cut in half what they spend, teens tell relatives they don't want presents but rather money so it can go to the poor who are their sisters and brothers in Christ. Others use a month's worth of retirement savings and still others take what they earn in bonuses or consulting jobs and give Jesus a present on His birthday.

During a normal Sunday worship, we tell guests we don't want them to feel obligated to give as the offering baskets are passed. On Christmas Eve, we tell everyone they have the privilege of getting close to the heart of Jesus, and they should not leave with any change in their pockets, purses, or wallets. One hundred percent of the Christmas Eve offerings go to the Christmas Offering.

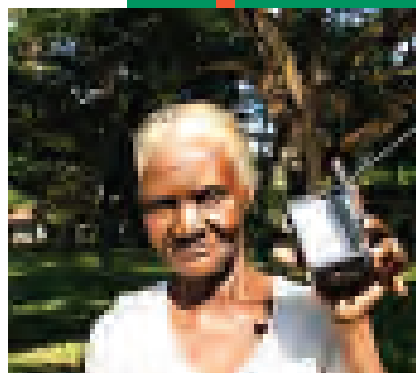
The point has never been the amount but the intent of the heart. It has changed Christmas for our congregation. We've taken Christmas back and made it a celebration of God's gift of Jesus and His plan of salvation. We can't alleviate the suffering of the whole world, but we can change our world by changing the lives of some of the poor. And we aren't just about global missions. We partner with an inner-city ministry in nearby Hamilton, Ohio, and they receive a tithe of this offering. This way everyone, whether they can travel to Haiti or not, can go to a place where the impact of Christmas is felt year round.

Making Disciples in Haiti

Bob and June Ewell, on staff with The Navigators' Church Discipleship Ministry, spent three weeks in Haiti teaching discipleship concepts to future pastors at the Emmaus Biblical Seminary in Cap-Haitien.

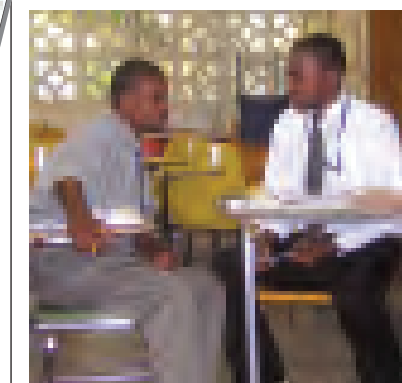
"I did there what I do here," Bob says. "I helped pastors learn to make disciples not by preaching only but also by meeting with and training individuals."

Bob worked with 12 students, teaching in the classroom three hours a day. "We spent an hour sharing our daily times with God, reviewing memory verses, and praying for our ministries," Bob says. Then he presented practical discipleship-related teaching.

"On the macro level, I was modeling a small group for them," he adds. "The main message was, 'You can reach the world, starting from where you are, but you can't do it by preaching. I hope you preach to thousands on Sunday, but on Monday, you'd better be meeting with people individually.'"

The director of the seminary wrote Bob about the importance of this training: "We need the kind of emphasis you brought, and I am deeply grateful. If it fits in with what God has called you to do, we would be grateful to have you come and teach again and again. These next few years will decide the future of the Haitian church."

Will We Meet Again?

One of the things about travel in India that I love, painful though it can be, is the opportunity to meet, pray for, and occasionally help in some small way, people in need. They are literally everywhere of course, so it is a daily experience. As I recalled some of those I've met on a recent trip, I thought of the book titled something like, *Five People You Meet in Heaven*.



The plight of women in India is obvious and often overwhelming to the outside world.

Here's one dear lady I hope to meet again. As I walked to one of the small shops on the train platform for a cup of chai, I noticed a poor woman squatting on the rough and dusty part of the platform that hadn't yet been finished. She was facing away from me so I looked back to get a better look as I passed. I was stunned as I watched her put a handful of dirt in her mouth! I couldn't believe my eyes. Never in ten years of traveling in India had I seen anyone do that. As if in denial, I walked on to get my tea and returned to where my friends and I were waiting for our train. The more I thought of her the more appalled I was. "Remember, this is India," one of my friends often reminds me. There are almost always beggars on a train platform, so this lady was nothing terribly odd. There were probably a couple dozen of us within sight of this poor woman, yet none of us moved to help her. But I was probably the only one who had seen what she'd just done. If I didn't help her, who would? There she was, once a beautiful young girl full of hopes and dreams, someone's daughter, perhaps a mother. What had gone so terribly wrong? The desolation of widowhood, the loss of children, malnutrition, mental illness? Only God knew.

I couldn't get her out of my mind. Finally, after a few agonizing minutes, I could stand it no longer and went to look for her. By then, she had moved to the other side of the tea stall. I found her squatting again on the rough, unfinished concrete. As I passed the same shop, I bought a fresh bottle of water and a pack of chips, then went and squatted next to her. The dirt was still in her mouth. I lifted her chin, gestured for her to spit it out, and began to pour water into her mouth. She awkwardly complied, and repeated the process several times until her mouth was reasonably clean. Then I grasped her dusty hands and began to pour water over them. As the water touched them, she immediately thrust them forward in the stream. She continued to wash reaching ever higher on her forearms. Yes, she still remembered what it was like to wash, feel clean. When my bottle was empty, I helped her stand. She rose awkwardly and wasn't steady. She started off, never really looking me in the face, for shame perhaps. She didn't want to eat the bag of food I offered, but did keep it. Clearly she wanted to leave. I steadied her briefly, helped her as far as the shop to buy her a fresh bottle of water, and watched her wander slowly, almost aimlessly towards the main part of the station. "Lord," I prayed, "Please help this dear lady. Lead her to your people in India, or them to her. Reveal yourself to her."
